2022 Operating Expenses & Revenue



Obscurity Events Bring New Audiences to World Forestry Center

The Discovery Museum's featured exhibit, *Obscurity: Life Inside the Smoke*, features original artwork by six Portland-area artists that explores our complex relationship with wildfire smoke.

The exhibit has brought new visitors to World Forestry Center. To mark its opening in early September, we hosted an opening reception. Over 150 attendees had the opportunity to immerse themselves in the exhibit and engage with the artists and curators. We hosted an artist talk in early November, offering a deeper understanding of the artistic process. A guided tour of the exhibition followed the presentation.

Magness Memorial Tree Farm Reopens to the Public







Magness Memorial Tree Farm, a 77-acre forest located in Sherwood, Oregon, has once again opened its gates to the public on Mondays between 8:00 am and 3:00 pm.

This scenic woodland has been owned and operated by World Forestry Center since 1977. Donated by Howard and Panzy Magness, the tree farm was originally developed as a demonstration site for woodland owners to showcase forest management and silviculture.

"We know that Magness is an important regional and community asset," said Experience Director Tim Hecox. "We're glad we can once again make it available for public recreation."

With 2.5 miles of hiking trails, sheltered picnic areas, meadows, streams, and forests, Magness is the perfect place to spend a day in the woods.

Location

Situated at 31195 SW Ladd Hill Road in Sherwood, Oregon, Magness is just a 45-minute drive from Downtown Portland. World Forestry Center has a staff member on-site during open hours, and visiting Magness is free of charge.

Exploring the Trails

Magness offers several trail options. The Nagle Loop, the Northwest Trail along Heater Road, and the South Trail between Corral Creek Road and Ladd Hill Road are open to the public. The Southeast Trail section on the east side of Ladd Hill Road is temporarily closed with plans to reopen in 2024. The Heater trail to the Northeast Heater Grove area is permanently closed at the request of the Heater family. §
